TOASTMASTER SKILLS ARE A LIFELONG LEARNING

CAREER APPLICATION

As an academic at James Cook University in Townsville, I use my Toastmaster skills when communicating my research to others through presentations and workshops at conferences all over the world. I have had people walk up to me several times after a presentation and tell me how much they enjoyed listening to me.



I attend conferences every year and apart from writing the factual research papers, I

enjoy the 15-minute presentations, where I have to summarise my entire research project in a nutshell. When presenting, people often make the mistake of repeating what they write in their research paper, and this can be unintelligible to the audience. What I do is I talk to them about my research as a narrative in simple language, without scientific jargon. I also make sure to tell them how it could benefit them, in order to capture their interest. In writing the speech, I make use of the speech composition rules in Toastmasters (international speech) and humour (humorous speech), while being aware of the importance of timing. Evaluation at Toastmasters has taught me to evaluate my presentation before I present, so that I receive maximum audience attention. At the end of the presentation, I have to answer questions and that's where my impromptu speaking skills from Table Topics come in handy.

These Toastmaster skills are also useful when I conduct face-to-face interviews with my university students. In asking questions and receiving responses, I use my Toastmaster evaluation skills to assess their responses not only for content, but also for how they communicate via body language, facial expressions, eye contact, etc.

The above photograph is from a poster session at an International Conference in Vancouver in 2018, where I had to explain our research off the cuff in one to two minutes to the conference attendees. I presented a collaborative research project with the Laurentian University (Canada) on career path mapping for mining professionals. In August this year I am presenting a research paper on the results of our project to an international audience at the University of Cincinnati in the U.S.A.

Toastmaster skills are not just for personal communication. They encompass our life and support us in all our life activities.


My name is Ivan Brewer.
